On 8 August 2025, our school burst into a sea of red and white as students and staff came together to commemorate Singapore's 60th National Day. This year, we were honoured to welcome our Guest of Honour, Director-General of Education, Mdm Liew Wei Li, who joined us in marking this special occasion. Mdm Liew had served as our school's 9th Principal from 2007 to 2010. The morning kicked off with the National Day Parade, a cornerstone of our National Day celebrations. The parade contingent featured our various uniformed groups, student leaders, staff, and the School Advisory Committee members. Leaders from the National Cadet Corps (Land) and the Girls' Brigade served as the flag party commander and parade commander respectively.





Students across all levels then continued the celebration with a range of activities. The lower secondary levels were encouraged to appreciate, reflect, and envision the Singapore of tomorrow through a curated CCE lesson. Through the NRIC Presentation Ceremony, our Sec 3 cohort took part in a meaningful rite of passage marking their journey towards becoming active Singapore citizens. Meanwhile, the Sec 4 students gained key insights into National Service through a talk by our alumnus, Mr Tng Zi Qiang Jake.

The celebration then saw the school gather once again for lively performances by both students and staff. Most notably, Mdm Liew delivered an inspiring speech that encouraged our students to be the leaders who will shape Singapore's future. National Day is more than just a celebration. It serves as a poignant reminder of what makes us proud to be Singaporeans – our resilience, unity, and shared dreams for the future.













Artist-in-School (Drama)

In Term 4, the Sec 3 Drama students engaged in an in-depth exploration of Longsword techniques, focusing on the integration of movement and narrative in order to develop their own original performance work.

As part of the Artist-in-School Scheme, students participated in masterclasses conducted by resident artist Mr. Muhammad Yazid Bin Abdul Jalil. These sessions introduced them to the intersection of Longsword Historical European Martial Arts (HEMA) and theatre devising. Students were encouraged to refine their physical vocabulary and apply HEMA-inspired movement principles in order to create cohesive, collaborative, and expressive drama pieces. The combination of drama and combat sparring was certainly an eye-opener for many!

Reflections on Artist-in-School

"Taking part in the European Martial Arts sessions was both exciting and eye-opening. We learned skills I had never even considered before, and it was fascinating to see how they could be applied to our drama work. Sparring was definitely the most memorable part — it gave us a way to release energy, step out of our comfort zones, and approach performance from a completely different angle. Connecting the Laban method of acting with combat techniques really helped me understand movement more deeply, and made me feel more confident exploring unfamiliar territory on stage."

Participating in 3–4 martial arts lessons was something I never expected when I chose this subject, but I have absolutely no regrets. We were introduced to different forms of sparring and movement, and learned how to incorporate martial arts techniques into our acting. My favourite part was sparring with classmates using rubber swords while suited up in protective gear—it truly felt like being on a film set! The experience opened my eyes to a completely new art form and enriched my drama learning by allowing me to explore something different and deepen my understanding of the subject. It also helped me develop greater physical awareness, coordination, and stage presence. Learning to move with intention and control made my acting more expressive and dynamic. I am really grateful for the opportunity."


